Literally translated as "for the greater glory of God," this concept is at the center of Jesuit education. At the Academy, this motto is engraved in the lobby stairs and is intended to remind our students, as they cross over these words, to dedicate all that they do each day to this aspiration. MagisLatin meaning the "more," Magis is the value of developing what God call us to do next for making ourselves, others, and our world better. The academic program at the Academy is challenging, demanding a serious approach to school. With a goal of preparing our students for admission to and success in a wide array of top independent and competitive admission public schools. Students are constantly striving to learn and become their best self.Men and Women for and with OthersAcademy students and graduates embody a spirit of giving and providing service to those in need, and they are encouraged to pursue justice on behalf of all persons. All students participate in service and opportunities are built-in to the curriculum and culture of the Academy. Several school-wide service days are set aside for projects like making casseroles for a homeless shelter, baking cookies and writing notes for residents at a local retirement home, or cleaning up the Federal Hill neighborhood. Additionally, each grade works with a particular organization during the school year. All students are assigned a one-to-one Chromebook which they sign out daily and use in every class. Additionally, students can access iPads for classroom use. Students become familiar with using web-based classroom sites to check for homework assignments, grades, communicate with teachers, and turn in assignments.
