[66] Influenced by the Eyes of the New French Wave Without a Face (1960) science fiction thriller Westworld (1973) and Black Christmas (1974) Halloween was directed, composed and co-written by Carpenter, who co-written it with his then-girl and partner producer Debra Hill on a \$300,000 budget provided by Syrian-American producer Moustapha Akkad. To minimize costs, the locations were reduced and time took place during a short period. Criticism that began with Friday 13 would lead to the eventual decline of the genre in subsequent years. The film became the subject of intense scrutiny in the wake of John Lennon's murder, and was heavily edited; missing Gore's draw, My Bloody Valentine sold barely 2 million tickets in North America, far less than the 15 million sold since Friday the 13th Tom Savini but major MPAA changes contributed to its failure in finding a national distributor. [22] Similar suffering censorship was The Burning, which also employed Savini's special effects, although it marked early films by Brad Grey, Holly Hunter, Jason Alexander, Fisher Stevens, Bob Weinstein and Harvey Weinstein. Both sequel sold about half of their original movie tickets, although they were still very popular (Halloween II was the second biggest horror movie of the year behind An Americanwolf in London). [72] Independent companies have thrown out slasher films Final Exam, Bloody Birthday, Hell Night, Don't Go in the Woods. Alone! Wes Craven's Deadly Blessing and Sci-fi genres continued to merge with the slasher film in Strange Behavior, Ghostkeeper and Evilspeak. The international market found Absurd, Madhouse and Bloody Moon from Germany. 1982 Straight-to-video productions cut costs to maximize profit. The independent horror movie Madman opened in the New York top 10, according to Variety, but soon dropped out of theaters for a much healthier life on home video.[22] The Dorm That Dripped Blood and Honeymoon Horror, each made for between \$50â90,000, became a hit in the early days of the VHS. [72] Due to this change, independent productions began to have difficulty finding a home VHS. Paul Lynch's Humongous was released through AVCO Embassy Pictures, but a change in management severely limited theatrical release of the movie. Movies like the hospital massacre and the night warning have enjoyed strong home rents from video stores, though Dark Sanity, The Forest, Unhinged, Trick or Treats, and the Island of Blood has fallen into obscurity with small theatrical releases and only sub-par video transfers. [81] Supernatural slasher movies continued to build in popularity with The Slayer, The Incubus, Blood Song, Don't Go to Sleep and Superstition (the supernatural Halloween franchise, does not adhere to the slasher movie formula). Alone in the Dark was New Line Cinema's first feature film, released at a low price and initially rejected by critics, although the film received a critical reappraisal. Director Amy Holden Jones and writer Rita Mae Brown presented a series of instrumental violence against men in the Slumber Party Massacre, [81] while Visiting Hours inflicted liberal feminism against right-wing macho bigotry with exploitative results. Friday 13th part III, the first slasher trilogy, was a huge success, selling 12 million tickets and dethroning E.T.: The Extra Terrestrial from the top of the box office. [72] The film's iconic hockey mask has grown into pop-culture iconography. Universal Pictures had a small release for Death Valley, while Columbia Pictures found modest success with Silent Rage. Independent distributor Embassy Pictures has released The Seduction for a staggering \$11 million, an erotic slasher-thriller that preys blockbusters Fatal Attraction (1987) and Basic Instinct (1992) for several years. [72] Australia released Next of Kin while the Puerto Rico tracks were filmed in Boston and Madrid by an Italian-American producer with a Spanish director. The Italian crime scene saw cinematic influences in their releases for Sergio Martino's Scorpione with Due Tail, Lucio Fulci's Lo Squartatore and Dario Argento's Tenebrae. The Camera on Sorority Row followed the same general plot as Prom Night (1980) with guilty teenagers persecuted and punished for a terrible secret. Final Terror borrows visual and thematic elements from Just Before Dawn (1981), as Sweet Sixteen borrows from Happy Birthday to Me (1981). The most successful slasher of the year was Psycho II, which grossed over \$34 million at the box office. The film also brought together original cast members Psycho (1960) Anthony Perkins and Vera Miles.[82] 10 at Midnight, inspired by Richard Speck's real-life crimes, promoted Charles Bronson for all his horror themes. Many 1984 slasher films with short theatrical scenes found varying degrees of success in home video, such as Splatter University, Satan's Blade, Blood Theatre, Rocktober Blood and Fatal Games. Movies like The Prey and the Evil Judgment were shot years earlier and finally had small theatrical releases. In 1909, the German Civil Engineer August Engelsmann patented a process that projected filmed shows within a physical decor on an effective phase.
