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Want to make your straight text curved without much hassle? If so, Adobe Photoshop has the exact feature you need. You can use it to curve your text in your specified bend level, and we'll show you how to make use of it. Make Curved Text in Photoshop To curve text in Photoshop, you basically apply the warp text effect to your text layer and choose a curve option. For the following steps, we assume you don't already have an image and you want to create one with your curved text on it. To start, launch Photoshop on your computer and create a new image. You can do this by selecting File > New from Photoshop's menu bar and choosing your image dimensions. When the blank image canvas opens, in Photoshop's left sidebar, select the text tool (a "T" icon). Alternatively, you can use the tool by pressing T on your keyboard. With the text tool now activated, click the area on your image where you want to add the curved text. Type your text, and when you're done, select the checkmark icon at the top. In the "Layers" panel on the right, select your newly created text layer. At the top of the Photoshop interface, click "Create Warped Text" (a "T" icon). Photoshop will open a "Warp Text" box. Here, click the "Style" drop-down menu and choose "Arc." Then drag the "Bend" slider to the left or right to make your text curved. Behind the text box, you will see your changes being applied to your selected text. When you're happy with the results, in the same "Warp Text" box, click "OK." Position the cursor on the canvas window, you now have your text curved. To change your curved text, you can do so without having to re-apply the curve effect. Simply click the existing text and you can add and remove characters from it. And that's how you make your text stand out by using a curved style. Very handy! Therefore, in this Photoshop guide, you will learn several methods of text outlining and text outline editing to create the perfect text curve for your projects.The simplest way to curve text in Photoshop is by using the Warp Text tool: Open Photoshop and create a new document or open an existing one.Select the Text Tool (T) from the toolbar.Click on your canvas and type your desired text.With the text layer selected, go to Edit > Transform > Warp (or right-click on the text layer and select "Warp Text").From the Warp dropdown menu in the options bar, select a text style: For a simple arch, choose "Arc"For a circular effect, try "Arc Lower" or "Arc Upper"For a wave effect, select "Wave" Use the Bend slider to control the intensity of the curve.Adjust the Horizontal Distortion and Vertical Distortion sliders for additional effects.Click the checkmark in the options bar or press Enter to apply the warp.You can always return to edit text after applying the warp by selecting the text layer and accessing the warp options again. This flexibility makes it easy to refine your text effect until it's perfect.For more control over your curved text, you can place text along a custom curved path: Select the Pen Tool (P) or any shape tool like the Ellipse Tool (U) to function as your path tool.Draw the path or shape you want your text to follow. For a circle, hold Shift while using the Ellipse Tool.Select the Text Tool (T) from the toolbar.Hover your cursor over the path until you see a small curved line appear on your cursor.Click on the path where you want your text to begin and type your message.To flip text to the outside or inside of a circle, go to Layer > Type > Vertical Type Orientation.To adjust the starting position, use the Path Selection Tool (A) and drag the text along the path.To change the baseline shift (how far the text sits from the path), highlight your text and adjust the baseline shift in the Character panel.Following this guide allows you to precisely control the shape of the text curve and is particularly well suited for circular logos or text that needs to follow certain contours in a design. For logo designs and stunning designs in general, keep curved text simple and legible - excessive curving can reduce readability.When creating circular text, use a larger text size than you might normally choose, as curving can make text appear smaller.Adjust letter spacing (tracking) in the Character panel when curving text to prevent awkward gaps or overcrowding.For text inside a circle, you'll often need to reduce tracking (letter spacing), while text outside a circle may need increased tracking.After creating curved text, you can still edit text content and formatting as needed - it remains fully editable text.Create a Smart Object of your text layer before applying additional effects to preserve editability.Consider adding a slight outer glow or drop shadow to curved text to help it stand out against complex backgrounds.For more advanced text effects, try combining curved text with layer styles like emboss, gradient overlays, or stroke effects. When working with backgrounds that make text placement difficult, consider using Generative Fill to create a clean area for your text to stand out.Save your curved text designs as PSD files to preserve layers and editability for future modifications.Other Photoshop guides and tutorials on text effects in various applications, as well as photo editing techniques and typography techniques can be found in the guides section. Experiment with different paths, warp settings and new formatting to create truly unique curved text effects for your projects. There are several ways to curve text in Photoshop. Some can be achieved with a few clicks, while others require more effort but give you more control over the curved text created. Here are the three best ways to do it. Whether you want a quick warp option, a customizable path method, or to create circular text using a circle. First, you need to write any text on the canvas. To do this, enable the Type Tool (T) in the Toolbar. Then, enter the desired text on the canvas. With the Type Tool active, go to the Options Bar and click the Warp Tool button. Within the Warp Text panel, select one of the arch styles available in the Style drop-down menu. To get a curved text, it's better to stick with the first three options. Adjust the warp settings as needed for the result you want. Leave the Horizontal option checked so you can have the text curved horizontally. Control the curve's prominence and orientation by adjusting the Bend. Positive percentages bend the curve downwards, and negative percentages bend it upwards. In Horizontal Distortion, you can make the curve more warped on its left or right side. If you want both sides equally distorted, set the Horizontal distortion to zero. Adjusting the Vertical Distortion slider will make the text appear vertically farther or closer to the screen. Once you've adjusted the settings to your liking, you will have curved the text. Before After First, enable the Pen Tool (P) from the Toolbar. Then, go to the Options Bar and change the pen mode to Path. After that, click once on the canvas to add the first anchor point. Then, click another part of the canvas to place the second anchor point, but this time, hold Shift while dragging with the mouse down. That will create a curved path. Once the curved path is created, enable the Type Tool by pressing T. You can also customize the text using the options available in the Options Bar if you want. Now, hover over the path until your cursor is crossed by a curved line. Next, type any text in the curved path. The text in the curved path has a start and end point. An X icon represents the start point. The endpoint is represented by a circle icon. You can change the text start and end points so you can add more text to the path. To do this, enable the Path Selection Tool (A) from the Toolbar. Then, hover over the text until an arrow points to the right appears next to your text. Position the cursor at the beginning of the text and drag it to the left. That will bring the starting point to the left and make room for more text. First, go to the toolbar and select the Ellipse Tool (U) under the Shape Tools. Then, go to the Options Bar and change the shape mode to Path. After that, click and drag on the canvas to create your ellipse. Ensure the Fill and Stroke options are set to Transparent. Once the shape is created, enable the Type Tool by pressing T on your keyboard. Then, hover over the shape until your cursor is crossed by a curved line. Next, enter your text on the curved path. You can adjust the text start and endpoint following the steps learned in the previous section to change a curved pen path. Select the text layer in the Layers Panel. Then, hit Control + T (Win) or Command + T (Mac) to enable the Transform Tool. After that, hover over one of the handles around the circle until it turns into a double-curved arrow. Then, rotate the text in the direction you want. In my case, I turned my text to the center of the canvas. When you're finished adjusting the text position, hit Enter on your keyboard to confirm the action, and the text will be ready to be used in any way you want. Curving text is one of the most popular ways to stylize text. It adds an aesthetic appeal to it, which is why I often use it in posters and ads, and I also recommend you use it whenever possible. With Photoshop's customization options for curved text, your result will surely meet your expectations. Happy Editing! Photoshop isn't really intended as a graphic design program, but there are plenty of reasons why you might need to create some arc text in Photoshop. Whether you're editing text within a photo, creating text for a photo-realistic digital art piece, or some other reason I can't even imagine, there are two main ways to blend your text in Photoshop: warping your text and placing your text along a curved path. Both methods have their advantages and disadvantages, and they both have very different ways of creating curved text. Warping your text alters the actual letterforms themselves but creates some interesting shapes while typing along a curved path maintains the original shape of the letterforms but can also sometimes cause them to overlap. Curving text with either method can negatively impact the readability and even the legibility of your text, so be sure to keep that in mind when you're working on your edit. I think Method Two is a better choice, but there are probably some situations where warping your text instead is a better choice. Probably. Method 1: Warped Text This method is probably the simpler of the two, although they're both very easy to do. First, switch to the Text tool and add some text. When you're happy with the content, locate the Create warped text button in the options panel above the main image window (see highlighted area in the screenshot below). Click the icon and Photoshop will open the Warp Text dialog box. In the Style dropdown menu, you'll find a wide range of preset warps, that can help you create curved text. Perhaps the most useful warp preset is Arc, which creates a minimal amount of distortion in your letterforms, but you can take your pick among the options. I'm not sure why you'd ever want to create warped text in the shape of a fish, but if you need to, you can. Adjust your settings as desired, click the OK button, and you're already done! Method 2: Text Along a Curved Path If you want to create curved text without actually distorting the letterforms in your text, you'll need to create a path first. Paths are actually vector objects that use mathematics instead of pixel dimensions to define their shapes. There are several ways you can create a curved path in Photoshop, depending on the kind of shape you want. You can use the Pen Tool to create freeform curves by placing anchor points and using adjustment handles to control the angle of the curves, or you can use the Ellipse Tool to create your path instead. Using The Pen Tool To create a freeform curved path, switch to the Pen Tool using the toolbox or the keyboard shortcut P. Click anywhere in your image to set your first anchor point, then click again to create a line between those two points. Clicking and dragging the mouse button to create the second point allows you to create a curve instead of a straight line, and you can adjust the anchor points and curvature later any time you want using the anchor points and curvatures handles. The light blue line shows the exact shape of the path, but it won't be visible in the saved image. Using the Ellipse Tool Creating text along a perfect circle is even easier using the Ellipse Tool. All of Photoshop's shape tools are nested in the same spot in the toolbox, and they all share the keyboard shortcut U. Pressing the shortcut repeatedly will cycle to the next tool in the set. Before you draw your ellipse, it's a good idea to change the Fill and Stroke color settings in the options panel to None (represented by a white box crossed with a red stripe) otherwise you'll wind up drawing a visible vector shape over your image instead of an invisible vector path. The white box crossed with a red stripe indicates that Photoshop should leave them empty if you forget to do this before drawing your shape, you can always just remove the fill and stroke afterward in the same location. You can also modify these settings in the Appearance section of the Properties panel. The Ellipse tool can be used in two ways: you can click and drag anywhere in your document to create your ellipse visually, or you can click once anywhere in the document to set the size of your ellipse using pixel values. Setting equal values for height and width will create a perfectly circular path. Adding Text To Your Curve Once you've created a curved vector path, you're ready to add text to it. Switch to the Text tool using the toolbox or the keyboard shortcut T, and place your cursor over the vector path in your document. The cursor icon will change, indicating that you can place text along the path. Just click once anywhere on the path to start typing along it! (Despite the new screenshot abilities of macOS Monterey, I still can't seem to screenshot the cursor change, but you can't miss it!) The eagle-eyed among you probably noticed that Photoshop also creates several text anchor points along the path. If you hold down the Command key while you click and drag those anchors, you can adjust the placement of your text within the path itself (use Ctrl instead of Command if you're using Photoshop on a PC). A Final Word You now know the secrets of how to curve text in Photoshop! There are several other techniques you could use, but these two are the only methods I know of that preserve the editability of your text. All the other options require you to rasterize your text first, which permanently converts the letterforms into pixel data instead of editable vector text. Curved text is very useful in graphic design projects, but as I said in the beginning, Photoshop isn't really intended as a design program. If you're looking for even more specialized text layout options, you might want to consider using Adobe Illustrator for your project.
