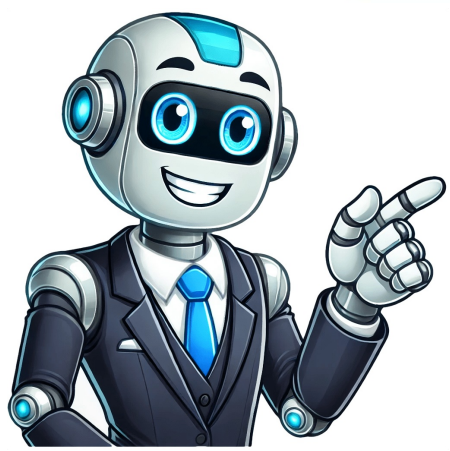

What is the Test Content Outline 6th Edition (TCO 6) that the BACB is adopting on 1/1/25? The primary purpose of TCO 6 is to guide the creation of the BACB exam from 1/1/25 going forward. Will the 5th Edition Task List still be in effect? No, TCO 6 has replaced the 5th Edition Task List. Will this change affect course content hours or my degree plan? No, this change will not affect course content or your degree plan. How will this change affect me? Depending on when you plan to sit for the BCBA/BCaBA exam, this change may or may not affect you. If you plan to sit on or before 12/31/24, we recommend using the 5th Edition Task List to guide your studying for the exam. If you plan to sit on or after 1/1/25, you will need to use the 6th Edition Task List. What changes will affect me? The changes to the task list will affect the exam content. The 6th Edition Task List has more content than the 5th Edition Task List. Version (V9)? Yes, BDBS has updated the CBA Modules to reflect TCO 6, which went into effect on 1/1/2025. Our VCS courses have been revised to align with these changes and replace the TL5 modules with the TL6 modules. The new courses were released for the C-Term on December 4, 2024, for the B-Term on January 2, 2025; and for the A-Term they will begin on January 29, 2025. Students in the B and C Terms have all been updated to TCO 6. A-Term students will finish the current term with TL5 modules and will be updated to TCO 6 on 1/29/2026. Students who plan to sit for the exam are encouraged to use the 5th to 6th Edition crosswalk to guide their study. Will the 'Sunset of the VCS' on January 1, 2026 affect my course content and eligibility to apply to sit for the exam? ABAI and BACB have jointly decided to revise their program recognition process and will no longer use the ABAI-based program grids to review program content hours and exam eligibility. Instead, when you apply to take the exam after 1/1/2026, the ABA Program Coordinator will submit a BACB-required Attestation to support your application. We will share more information on that process as it evolves. In the meantime, there will be no changes to course content or eligibility requirements. Are there additional changes coming from BACB in 2027? Yes, Effective 1/1/2027, the BACB adds these additional coursework tasks that may affect your program, depending on when you apply to test. The primary change will be an addition of required hours of 'Organizational Behavior Management,' the area now covered under the title of 'Supervision and Personnel Management.' Will these changes affect content hours or my degree plan? Yes, these changes will affect BACB required content hours. We are advising our colleges to meet these requirements, however, depending on the timing of your degree plan and graduation, and if you apply to sit after 1/1/27, you may be required to return for additional coursework. Please be aware of the possible impact of these changes on your degree plan. What changes will affect me for the exam? The changes to the task list will affect the exam content.
