Find out what this means for you, your family and your community: A nurse who specialises in heart care was part of a group of Essex NHS workers welcomed to Buckingham Palace this month to celebrate their dedication to helping local patients. Sharon was nominated to attend the garden party at the royal palace in London alongside Professor Nick, Joint Regional Chief Dental Officer for the East of England, and Ryan, Associate Director for Intermediate Care, Allied Health Professional and Specialist Services at Essex Partnership University NHS Foundation Trust, with the group together representing the NHS in the east of England. Sharon is the Lead Arrhythmia Nurse Specialist at the Essex Cardiothoracic Centre (CTC), the leading heart and lung centre based at Basildon Hospital. The CTC treats patients from across Essex and the wider region. She provides advanced treatments for patients with arrhythmia and has pioneered the use of new technology to improve patient outcomes with a smartphone app called FibriCheck. The app uses light from a patients phone camera to measure blood flow in their finger, tracking irregular heart rhythm after a procedure and it shares the data with the team at the CTC in real-time. Staff at the hospital can then review and track variations in heart rhythm and offer guidance or adjust the patients medication, meaning they do not have to come to hospital as often. Sharon said: I feel so very grateful to have been nominated by my Trust and NHS England for my contributions to using digital technology in heart rhythm care for the region. I was absolutely thrilled to have received a Royal Garden Party invitation on behalf of the regions NHS. It was a special moment walking through the Buckingham Palace gates to see the Royal Family, and truly a once in a lifetime memorable experience! Patients, staff and political leaders have marked the official opening of an advanced cancer treatment facility at Southend Hospital. Nicky Whilde, Head of Radiotherapy Physics at Mid and South Essex NHS Foundation Trust, said: This is an advanced piece of equipment that will mean that more patients in mid and south Essex receive their radiotherapy with the latest technology. It uses surface-guided radiation therapy cameras to guide the radiotherapy, meaning that radiation is delivered to the exact location of the tumour and minimises damage to surrounding healthy tissues. The machine can also adapt its doses at the tumour changes shape over time.The machine has already started to be used, with 20 patients being given a daily radiotherapy course since February. One of the guests who cut the ribbon was Leslie Cast , 79, from St Lawrence, Maldon, the very first patient to receive radiotherapy using the new machine. Mr Cast was joined by Bayo Alaba, MP for Southend East and Rochford; David Burton-Sampson, MP for Southend West and Leigh; Dame Rebecca Harris, MP for Castle Point; and Richard Holden, MP for Basildon and Billericay; and Councillors from Southend and Essex County Councils. The 5.3million purpose-built extension to the radiotherapy department at Southend Hospital, the location of the Essex Cancer Centre, is a major step forward in local cancer treatment. Our #MSETeam were joined by colleagues from Alzheimers Society as they visited Florence Nightingale ward and sang popular songs for patients living with dementia. After 18 years caring for critically ill patients as an ICU Clinical Facilitation Sister at Broomfield Hospital, Katie swapped scrubs for running shoes and completed the London Marathon! She ran to raise funds for a new ICU garden a peaceful space for patients and families during some of their toughest moments. Katie said: Caring for critically ill patients and supporting their families is both challenging and fulfilling. Running has become essential to my wellbeing, helping me stay strong both physically and mentally. When I got the email confirming my place, I was overjoyed! Its an honour to run for the ICU and fulfil a lifelong dream. #ThrowbackThursday Meet Liv, Senior Operating Department Practitioner (ODP). We have around 100 ODPs working in our Trust. For National #ODPDay, we spoke to Liv about her job and why it matters so much to patients having surgery. I work across adults, paediatrics, maternity and burns and my role includes getting all the equipment ready in the theatre, carrying out safety checks, preparing the patient for their procedure and ensuring their safety and comfort throughout their operation. I also attend emergency callouts in other areas of the hospital." The ability to create open and trusting relationships quickly with patients is vital. An ODP is often the last person a patient will see before surgery and the first person they see afterwards. It is a real privilege to be able to provide reassurance when someone is feeling vulnerable and perhaps frightened, or when a parent is placing their child in our care for surgery." We are part of a close-knit team and we all support each other. I feel very lucky that we all get on so well together to spend ten hours a day with someone in the same operating theatre, and not be sick of them by the end of it, is quite an achievement! I always try to be the voice of the patient in all situations, ensuring their needs are met and their dignity is preserved." Dr Danielle, Consultant Anaesthetist at Broomfield Hospital spoke to us about the importance of ODPs: The relationship between anaesthetists and ODPs is incredibly close. They play a central role within the theatre team, often the bridge between anaesthesia, surgeons and theatre nursing staff they really hold the multidisciplinary team together." 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
