Skip to main content NRL Score Centre Share The Panthers showed their class once again with a gutsy 14-6 win in the grand final rematch that has left the Broncos' top four chances on life support. Brisbane needed to win this one a lot more than their rivals but when it really mattered it was Penrith who came up with the big plays at Suncorp Stadium. Kevin Walters' men led 6-4 at halftime but didn't trouble the scoreboard in the second half as the three-time reigning premiers grinded their way to victory. MATCH CENTRE: Broncos v Panthers, teams, stats, videoThe Panthers are now outright second on the ladder and up to their eyeballs in claiming a fourth minor premiership in five years, and fourth straight title. Penrith playmaker Jack Cole scored the opener on Friday night with his first touch of the ball after finishing a nice team try in the 11th minute. Cole had only just onto the field to replace Dane Laurie who limped up the tunnels with a hamstring injury. In his first game for the Broncos in 40 days, Reece Walsh showed his blistering speed to make a break then burn Panthers rival Dylan Edwards and score in the 27th minute. But the hosts lost halfback Jock Madden for the night in the 42nd minute when he tore his hamstring, an injury that will tests the Brisbane's halves stocks. The Panthers opened the scoring in the second half with an incredible try against the run of play. They were allowed to catch a nothing bomb that was put up on halfway and two passes and a grubber later and Brian To'o finished in the second half as Penrith just kept grinding away and hooker Mitch Kenny sealed it when he darted out of dummy-half to score in the 69th minute. Here are the three biggest talking points out of the match. BRONCOS' FINALS HOPES FADING The Broncos have now lost five in a row for the first time since 2020, when they won the wooden spoon, and they could sit 12th by the end of the round. They're going to need to win six of their final eight games just to play finals this year. Brisbane face the Dragons, Knights, Bulldogs, Titans, Cowboys, Eels, Dolphins and Storm to finish the season. "In my experience in rugby league, if you keep training well and turning up and putting in the effort we did tonight, it will turn," coach Kevin Walters said. "I've been at clubs as a player and an assistant coach where we've lost five games in a row, I think the record at the Broncos is eight or nine, we don't want to break that record. "It's just sticking together, we'll set sail for a strong finish to the season. It's just not there for us at the moment." NRL great James Graham said on Fox League that Brisbane should have kicked on from last year's grand final. "It can be quite frightening when you're a Broncos supporter looking at that ladder and how it might look on Sunday evening," Graham said. "The situation is this, you need 13 wins to play finals football and the Broncos have eight games left, so they need to find six victories. "It's pretty tough as well, next week they play the Dragons, both teams without their Origin players and then backing up from Origin they take on Newcastle. "Somehow they need to find six wins and you'd even say it's a disappointment if the Broncos don't make the top four. "Look back at last year's grand final, earth shattering (result) but the talk was it was going to be the building of this Broncos' team. "That was the best 40 minutes to start a game that I've seen from the Broncos all season, but it makes you wonder, where was that against the Titans, against the missing the top eight, we're talking about them in the top four but they're nowhere near that at the moment." THE GAME-CHANGING MOMENTK angaroos, Blues and Panthers workhorse Liam Martin is known for his effort plays and they were full display in a match-turning moment on Friday night. It was Martin who put Brian To'o over to score. "That was a really good example of competing," Penrith coach Ivan Cleary said. "I thought it was a tough game with a lot of end to end footy and it's just all those little moments that make the difference. And usually those moments are won by the players who are prepared to compete the hardest and that was a good example of not just competing but the ability to actually get the job done. "That was a pivotal moment in the game, definitely." Martin also made two try-saving tackles and the backrower was arguably the difference between the sides. "I just felt like the boys really wanted to win tonight and however it was going to work out they were going to find a way to do it and that gives us a lot of heart for the future," Cleary said. BRONCOS WALKING WOUNDEDThe Broncos injury ward grew again on Friday night with Jock Madden limping off with a serious hamstring injury. It means Kevin Walters is down to his fourth-string No. 7 and the coach confirmed they'll need to go outside their top 30 to field a side. Brisbane halfbacks Madden, Adam Reynolds and untested rookie Cody Black are all sidelined which will see Josh Rogers handed the reins against the Dragons next weekend. "(Madden) will be (out) for a good month or longer," Walters said. "(Rogers) has got the bye this week (in Queensland Cup) so he'll be right to go next Saturday against the Dragons. "He was outstanding (in his last game for the Broncos) so it's good for him, not so good for lock but pretty good for him to get another crack at this level. "(Ben) Te Kura is still a mile off. We get (Jordan) Riki back next week from suspension and Kotoni (Staggs) comes back as well which is a big help. "We're going to have to go outside the top 30 now, Jock down tonight, we'll have two or three in Origin, possibly four. A try to Luron Patea followed that moment to put the Panthers back in the lead. Watch the 2025 NRL premiership live and free on Nine and 9Now. Then just before half time, Cleary went back two years. The halfback took the ball at first receiver on the left with five Brisbane defenders all sliding before Cleary stepped inside and went past Adam Reynolds to score. It mirrored the 2023 grand final effort when Cleary scored the match-winner by stepping inside and passing Reynolds on that occasion too. "That's grand final like, that was the last try of the grand final," Andrew Johns said of the Magic Round try. Billy Slater added: "That's identical". After the break, Penrith's lead extended through Thomas Jenkins who scored a double to make it 32-8. As Cleary lined up his conversion, Johns was full of praise. "He's been a 10 out of 10 today," the league Immortal said. "That early kick then he went down and smashed Cobbo, this could really be turning point in the Panthers season. He has just dragged them along. "Phil Gould was also happy to see the champions back at their best. No further points came for either side as the question now sits whether the defending premiers are officially back. Next week the Broncos play Wayne Bennett's Rabbitohs while the Panthers are up against North Queensland. A moment of Reece Walsh magic lit up the venue for the State of Origin decider, but Ivan Cleary's side continued their stranglehold over their title rivals, overcoming a half-time deficit to down Brisbane in wet conditions. Walters will be on State of Origin duty and back-up halfback Jock Madden limped from the field with a serious hamstring injury. Adam Reynolds is not due back for weeks from a biceps problem. It would seem unthinkable at the start of the year, but will the Broncos be top eight casualties? They remain two points outside a logiam of teams from fifth through to eight, all of whom are yet to play this round. "We're nowhere near the [chocolates] at the moment," Walters said. Walsh scored a stunning solo try in the opening half - his first since the sickening State of Origin knockout in game one - but Brisbane looked impotent at times as the Panthers' near flawless defence swallowed up attack. Walsh's effort gifted the Broncos a 6-4 half-time lead after Jack Cole opened the scoring for Panthers seconds after running onto the field to replace the injured Daine Laurie (hamstring). Credit: Getty Images But the Panthers ground their way to the win with a miraculous try in the second half, Liam Martin catching Jarome Luai's midfield bomb uncontested, then dumping the ball to prop Lindsay Smith, who kicked expertly for Brian To'o to score. Mitch Kenny's dummy-half effort 12 minutes from time secured the victory, which lifted the Panthers into second, two points behind the table-topping Storm. Melbourne clash with the Tigers at Leichhardt Oval on Saturday night. Two-time Clive Churchill Medal winner Nathan Cleary is expected to return after the Panthers' bye when they take on the Dolphins.
