Transitioning from Easy to higher difficulty levels in Bloons requires knowing your monkey's strengths and weaknesses to succeed. The game features over 20 unique towers with different strategies for each one. As you level up, you'll notice some monkeys are overpowered while others are underutilized, requiring adaptability to play effectively. You can choose to front-stack or spread out your monkeys across the path, depending on your strategy. Each monkey has its own abilities and upgrades, making them fun to experiment with. Permanent upgrades become available after training your monkeys further, adding an extra layer of depth to the game. Visual upgrades are also a key part of the experience, allowing you to customize your monkeys' appearance as they level up. However, it's worth noting that upgrade descriptions are only available initially and can't be re-checked during gameplay. Each monkey has two upgrade paths, with five unique upgrades per path. You can't fully maximize each unit, but you can create a different strategy by placing multiple units on the field. The game also features other types of towers, such as banana trees that generate in-game currency or monkey huts that buff nearby monkeys. Bloons offers a massive 50+ levels across various settings, including farms, icebergs, hedge mazes, and space. Pathways vary greatly in difficulty, providing plenty of opportunities to adapt your strategy; a path with no obstacles means playing the same old game every time. But here, you can try out new strategies and placements in various levels, including some with pools of water to test your aquatic units' capabilities. Besides the main campaign, there are plenty of unique modes that add a ton of replay value and longevity. These special modes are like mini-challenges where you need to complete specific objectives for extra rewards. I particularly enjoyed playing a scenario where I had \$50,000 in starting cash and had to fend off a massive wave of balloons with just that amount – it was tough but exciting. The game has an overwhelming amount of content, including levels, upgrade paths, units, modes, difficulties, and more than I initially expected. After a few hours, I thought I'd seen everything, but as it turns out, there's still plenty to play and unlock. Easy mode is perfect for newcomers, while the harder difficulties will put even seasoned veterans to the test. Although Bloons TD 5 has a similar feel to its mobile origins, I'm relieved to report that it's free from microtransactions – but it does have multiple currencies, which seems unnecessary without the original in-game economy. Earning coins is slow unless you're willing to grind for them, which requires dedication if you want to access the best upgrades and improvements. Initially, I was skeptical about trying Bloons TD 5, but its quality and mechanics far exceeded my expectations compared to other tower defense games. Ninja Kiwi has done an excellent job of adapting their game for console without making it feel like a cheap port. The cute visuals and silly premise might make you underestimate the game's depth, but trust me – this is a solid tower defense experience that's worth playing if you're a fan of the genre. However, this shouldn't be taken as a challenge to the PlayStation 4; it merely acknowledges the game's roots. Bloons TD 5 works by letting you start with a cash budget to buy a tower monkey and choose where to place it, with waves of balloons arriving only after you press triangle. This pattern continues after each wave, allowing for ample time to plan your defense before committing. You'll have 50 waves to survive on the easiest setting, earning a bronze medal upon success. Harder difficulties add more waves, requiring strategy and planning to progress. As you play, new monkeys become available, and gold earned from destroyed balloons can be used to upgrade existing ones or purchase more, reflecting the game's mobile origins. However, this leads to multiple currencies that can confuse matters and hinder progression. The game features numerous levels with different backgrounds and themes, each unlocking as you progress through the game. Some of these backgrounds might make it difficult to track balloon paths, but this issue resolves itself once the first balloon begins its journey. Bloons TD 5 is indeed a challenging game, especially if you want it to be, with difficulty settings available for each attempt. The challenge ramps up exponentially as you progress through maps and levels, requiring precise placements and strategic thinking. Grinding your towers can alleviate some of this stress but might turn the game into a chore rather than an enjoyable experience. The game's transition from mobile to the PlayStation 4 DualShock 4 controller has led to the creation of a new control scheme that, while functional, never felt entirely natural. The inclusion of a cursor controlled by the left stick can feel cumbersome. Besides its standard campaign mode, the game offers couch multiplayer and daily challenges, providing loot for completion. Overall, Bloons TD 5 is a solid tower defense game but doesn't particularly stand out or use the PlayStation 4's capabilities to their fullest extent, with many mobile hangovers still present.
